### Spotlight: Finley's Fighters

To see young Finley's calming presence, you wouldn't imagine the many challenges she has already faced so early in life.

When Finley's parents, Ashley and Tim, learned they were expecting their fourth child, they were elated. The high-school sweethearts always wanted a large family. Even amid the challenges of Tim's military deployments, they were grateful for the gift of another baby.

Ashley's pregnancy appeared normal. As her delivery date neared, they decided to have a gender-reveal party. The blood test results were not what they expected.

Ashley's doctor shared there was a high likelihood Finley would have Down syndrome.

After the shock of the potential diagnosis settled, they began to prepare for Finley's birth and the possibility of raising a child with special needs.

Finley entered the world small, weighing just two pounds. From the start, she proved to be a fighter.

Many children born with Down syndrome have heart issues, and Finley was no different.

Ashley and Tim were told to expect surgeries to repair two holes in Finley's heart and to correct a narrowed aortic arch that threatened her safety.

From that point forward, Finley's parents experienced what they describe as series of miracles. Each time they prepared for a procedure, doctors found surgery was no longer necessary. The holes in her heart closed. Further, the aortic arch stayed open.

Similarly, each time Finley appeared to be at risk, her condition improved. **{continued}**

#### **Meet Raines**

"Raines is two years old and is a happy and funloving little boy. Raines loves his younger sister Reid.

Raines is now battling cancer for the second time.

He was diagnosed with bilateral retinoblastoma in 2022 — cancerous tumors in both eyes. He initially did six rounds of intra-arterial chemotherapy. He also had injections of chemotherapy drugs directly into his right eye. Because of these treatments, his tumors became inactive.

Unfortunately, about three months later, Raines' cancer metastasized to his brain and his spinal cord. He began a new protocol of chemotherapy, which involves four rounds of intravenous treatment, followed by a stem cell transplant. Today is our 41st day inpatient for the transplant.

Finley's family stayed at RMH during her 88 days in the neonatal ICU. She's now home in Harnett County with her parents, big brother, and two sisters. She continues to thrive — and to teach everyone she meets about courage and true love.
